Grad Rehearsal

Students need to be at CLA by 8:30 am. The rehearsal will take approximately 1.5 hours. All students must attend. Students wear every day clothes. Do not bring gowns/hats.

School Attendance Expectations

Graduates are excused from classes for Thursday, June 7 in the morning. All other classes will resume as usual. If graduates must miss classes due to appointments, they are responsible to make up the missed work.

Grad Ceremony

Each grad will receive 3 free tickets to the Grad Ceremony for family/friends. Grads can apply for extra tickets at \$10 each. Seating is limited.

The Grad Ceremony is a formal ceremony. The formality of the ceremony does not allow for disruptive behavior or noisemakers of any kind. It will be over 2 hours in length and the expectation is that all audience members will remain at the ceremony for the entire time. It is not advisable for small children to attend as the length of the ceremony will be a challenge for them.

*All guests must present their tickets at the door.

*Graduates must wear appropriate attire including footwear.

*Graduates need to remember to put their name in their hat. They keep the hat as a souvenir but near the end of the ceremony they are asked to toss their hat into the air. We want to ensure they get their hat returned to them if it is lost.

***All photos with graduates in gowns must be taken prior to the ceremony as they will be handing their gown immediately following the ceremony.**

Grad Dinner and Dance

Tickets: \$65 for Grads and Guests

Dessert Tickets for Parents: These will only go on sale if we make the dinner quota imposed by the hotel.

As with any school event, if a student is suspected of being under the influence of drugs or alcohol, they will not be able to enter the Dinner/Dance and **no refund** of the ticket will be given. Security at the hotel will be checking students as they enter. In addition the LSS Administration team will be checking students.

There are no “tickets” for the Grad Dinner and Dance. You will be signed in as you arrive and given your table number and seating assignment. Souvenir tickets will be provided at that time.

Parents joining us for Coffee/Dessert at 7:30 pm need to show tickets.

Dry Grad Event

Parents organize the Dry Grad Event and the event changes each year. Students participating in the Dry Grad Event may check in their change of clothes at the hotel. Parents will be hosting a coat check for you. You will need to arrange for someone to pick up your Dinner/Dance clothing from you just prior to midnight. All Dry Grad participants will board the bus at midnight to begin this event.

Are you “walking across the stage” in June?

Only those students who are in a position to graduate will be permitted to participate in the Graduation Ceremony in June.

The report cards distributed in February provide the final grades in courses from Semester One. If a grade 12 student has any failed courses on this report card, they need to make an appointment with a counselor to check if they are still in a position to graduate. See below for details regarding what constitutes “position to graduate.” The date that each potential graduate will be reviewed is **May 1, 2012**. At that time, if a student is not in a position to graduate, they will be removed from the graduation list and not permitted to participate in the Graduation Ceremonies in June 2012.

Criteria for Being in a Position to Graduate

- Student must have completed or have a reasonable expectation of completing 80 credits (48 credits for required courses, 28 elective credits, and 4 credits for Graduation Transitions). 16 of these credits must be at the grade 12 level.
- Any courses in progress outside of Langley Secondary, must be 80% complete with a passing grade as of May 1, 2011.
- Any courses in progress at Langley Secondary must have a passing or near passing grade as of May 1, 2011.
- Graduation Transitions 12 must be complete..

GRAD TRANSITIONS 12 at LSS

2011-2012

Grad Transitions 12 is a B.C. Ministry requirement for graduation. It is organized in various models across the province but the learning outcomes are the same and are mandated by the provincial government. At Langley Secondary, the Grad Transitions 12 requirement can be met through the completion of 3 packages and a presentation. The packages explain how to demonstrate the learning outcomes for Grad Transitions 12 and include the areas of: Health and Wellness, Community Connections and Career and Life.

This requirement includes three packages that you must complete to our satisfaction within the first semester of your grade 12 year. This information as well as other helpful resources is located under **GRAD INFORMATION** on our school website (www.langleysecondary.com). **Students must complete all of the packages by Christmas 2011.** Please keep in mind that physical activity hours and work/volunteer experience hours are hours completed in your grade 11 and 12 year only.

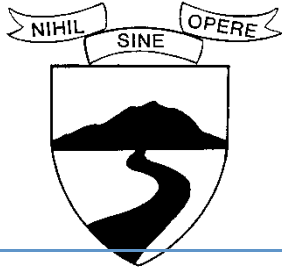
This graduation requirement is not graded but each package must be submitted to your advisor in the office by the due date. The advisor will review the package. If the criteria have not been met in the package, it will be returned to you. You must complete all of the criteria to our satisfaction on each package to receive a “Requirements Met” on your report card and transcript. All 3 packages and the presentation must be completed to our satisfaction to meet this graduation requirement.

Deciding On a Post Secondary Institution

Once a student has decided to attend post-secondary, they must choose the type of program they wish to attend. There are currently seven types of post-secondary institutions in BC:

- Public universities
- Private universities
- Public university-colleges
- Public colleges
- Private colleges
- Institutes
- Open Learning Agency

A student's decision should be based on educational need, financial need and emotional/social need. Post-secondary programs can be researched using the internet, college calendars and viewbooks, and by attending open houses and information sessions. It is very common to begin a program at one institution, such as a university-college, and transfer to another institution after completing one or two years.

Admission Deadlines

The following is a list of dates when post-secondary institutions will begin accepting applications for Fall 2012. As most college and institute programs accept on a first-come first-serve basis, students are encouraged to submit their application on the first day. Universities accept students based on their Grade Point Average. All public post-secondary schools in BC can be accessed for application through www.pas.bc.ca

This should serve as a guide only! You are encouraged to check with the post-secondary institution you are interested in to ensure that you know the deadline dates for your specific program as they are often different than the general application deadlines.

Each post-secondary institution has both general admission requirements and a unique set of admission requirements for each program. Students and parents are encouraged to consult a college's calendar or website for specific information.

Private Colleges and Universities

As these institutions are privately run, they set their own admission requirements. It is recommended that you contact them directly if you are interested in their programs.

English Assessment Requirements

Most institutions will require some sort of English assessment in order for a student to be eligible to register in a first-year English course. The most common of these assessments is the Language Proficiency Index (LPI). Students can register for this exam at www.lpi.ubc.ca. Generally, a student can be exempt from the exam by having a final mark in English 12 that is sufficiently high (the mark required varies from institution to institution). Again, **students should check the prerequisites of their program and institution to see if they meet this exemption.**

Provincial Exams

Students are no longer required to take provincial exams except for those that mandatory for high school graduation (English 10, Math 10, Science 10, Social Studies 11, English or Com 12). The ministry will be looking at providing scholarships to students who receive high marks on these exams. More details to come.

PSI FORM CHEAT SHEET

Students applying to post secondary need to complete a PSI form. This will allow your marks to be forwarded from the Ministry of Education. Deadline is April 30, 2012.

 - Going to an out of province school (other than Ontario)? See Ms. Statham

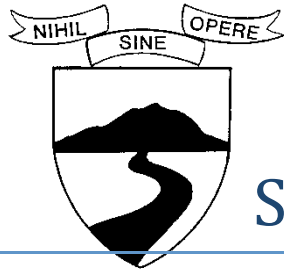

Introduction

It provides information on applying to scholarships and bursaries, accessing student loan information and resources or opportunities through the provincial government and other Canadian institutes.

Information is readily accessible to the individual through the internet and by telephone.

Many post-secondary institutes around the Lower Mainland have tour dates and meetings for specific program information. You will find some of this information on the bulletin board outside of the counselling center but the best way to find out about these dates and times is to contact the student admissions office as often each department will have its own information events.

The Ministry of Education publishes a document which is available on the internet. It is a resource book of opportunities, scholarships, bursaries, awards and financial aid available to BC graduates.

Included in this document are:

- Lists of open entrance scholarships to BC universities, colleges and private institutions
- Entrance scholarships across Canada
- Limited application entrance scholarships (not solely based on academic criteria)
- List of available bursaries
- Other awards and scholarships offered through private companies and institutions
- Student loan and financial assistance information

Passport to Education

Passport to Education money is awarded every year to the top students of each grade in grades 10, 11 and 12. Passport money may be used at a recognized post-secondary institution (BC and elsewhere) which has been approved by the Ministry of Education. Awards have the following value:

- Grade 10 - \$250.00
- Grade 11 - \$250.00
- Grade 12 - \$500.00

The criteria for deciding Passport winners is based on a percentage of academic and elective courses.

Financial Aid

There are three main types of financial aid for post-secondary education.

- **Scholarships** – generally based on academic performance and/or community involvement. These awards are non-repayable.
- **Bursaries** – awarded on basis of need and are non-repayable.
- **Loans** – granted for financial need and must be repaid.

Scholarships:

There are six basic types of scholarships available to students graduating from a Langley District school.

- Graduation Program Examination Scholarships (academic)
- Dogwood District/Authority Awards
- University/College Entrance Awards
- Langley District Scholarships
- Langley Secondary School Scholarships
- Private Scholarships

Scholarships generally recognize high academic performance, but some also have more specific criteria related to the donor or the intended use of the scholarship. Students are advised to prepare a resume and a short biography of themselves, highlighting not only their academic career, but also any community work and extracurricular involvement. As scholarships can be highly competitive, students should be aware

that showing a wide range of skills and interests, as well as true involvement reflects well for the student who is applying. Increasingly, students are awarded scholarship money based on leadership involvement and volunteer service.

1. Graduation Program Examination Scholarships (academic)

- Students who qualify are awarded a \$1,000 voucher which may be used at a recognized post-secondary program within five years. The top twenty students in the province receive an additional \$1,500.
- Students must receive at least a “B” (73%) in English 12 or TPC 12.
- Awards are determined based upon the student’s provincial exam scores.
- AP exam scores will now be eligible for use in the calculation for this particular award.

2. Dogwood District/Authority Awards

- District Provincial Scholarships are awarded to those students who achieve a high standard in a specific area of interest.
- They are calculated on the student’s top 5 courses in a specialty area, Math 11, English 11, Social Studies 11, Science 11, English 12 and an additional three courses in grades 11 and 12 (not including provincial examinable courses).
- The number of awards give in the district is based on a percentage of the number of students graduating.
- Value of the award is \$1,000 (\$500 to the student and \$500 voucher to the university)
- A student will be eligible to receive both a Graduation Program Examination Scholarship and a Dogwood District/Authority Award.

3. Langley District Scholarships

- Langley District Scholarships are those scholarships granted to students by various firms, community groups, individual sponsors, service groups etc. for post-secondary education.
- They are based on a variety of criteria and school performance although generally a minimum of C+ average is required on top 12 grade 11/12 courses
- Awards range from \$100 to \$1,000
- Applications will be available in February 2008 in the counselling center.
- Recipients will be announced at the graduation ceremony in June.

4. Langley Secondary School Scholarships

- These scholarships are similar to the district scholarships but they are awarded exclusively to students at LSS.

5. College/University Entrance Awards

- Most colleges and universities offer considerable awards to first-year students.
- Some awards are available automatically based upon entrance average (GPA – 86% or higher)
- Major entrance awards often require a separate application
- Search the ministry website listed on the second page of this package to determine what awards are available at your chosen university.

6. Private Scholarships

- Many scholarships are available through private companies, unions and associations. Some scholarships may be found on the internet at:

BC Student Assistance Program

The BC Student Assistance program is a program that gives repayable loan and non-repayable grants to eligible students based on financial need.

The Student Services Branch of the Ministry of Advanced Education, Training and Technology will review the costs and income on your application to determine how much assistance you receive. With one application, you apply for the BC Student Loan, the Canadian Student Loan, BC Grants and the Canadian Millennium Scholarship.
